RCT Presents "The Laramie Project"

RCT presents a show based on a true story, "The Laramie Project" Feb. 9-11 (730PM) and Feb. 12 at 230PM. In 1998, a twenty-one-year-old college student was kidnapped, severely beaten, and tied to a fence in the middle of the prairie outside Laramie, Wyoming. His bloody, bruised, and battered body was not discovered until the next day, and he died several days later in an area hospital. His name was Matthew Shepard, and he was the victim of this assault because he was gay. Moisés Kaufman and the Tectonic Theater Project made six trips to Laramie over the course of a year and a half, in the aftermath of the beating and during the trial of the two young men accused of killing Shepard. They conducted more than 200 interviews. The Tectonic Theater members have constructed a deeply moving theatrical experience from these interviews. "The Laramie Project" is a breathtaking collage that explores the depths to which humanity can sink and the heights of compassion of which we are capable.

"The Laramie Project" is a Tectonic Theater Project and uses the concept of "Moments." There are not standard scenes. All actors will be on stage the entire show, and they will be performing multiple roles. They will have some points in the show where only they are speaking, others where they will be interacting with others, and some points when they are doing nothing. Everything needed will be on stage the entire show, and scene changes will be done by the actors. The set will be minimal, extensive multimedia will be used.

The play is intended for a PG 13 audience for mature subject matter and some strong adult language some may find offensive. It also contains a positive message of hope which we feel outweighs the adult theme. Audience members are invited to stay after the show to participate in a discussion of the show led by cast members. You may want to consider if younger audience members are emotionally ready to see this.

The show is being directed by Michael Brown and produced by Brian Angell. Tickets are available at the RCT web site or can be purchased at the door. Reservations can be made by calling 339-5720 between 6 and 9PM starting Feb. 2.

At its last Board meeting, RCT selected the following plays for its 2017-2018 season.

- Musical Pirates of Penzance The Pirates of Penzance or, The Slave of Duty is a comic opera in two acts, with music by Arthur Sullivan and libretto by W. S. Gilbert. October 5-8 and 13-15 2017.
- Drama Radium Girls The Radium Girls were female factory workers who contracted radiation poisoning from painting watch dials with radioactive glow-in-the-dark paint around 1917. December 7-10 2017.
